

A TIMELINE OF NCSPP HISTORY

Founded in 1976, the National Council of Schools and Programs of Professional Psychology (NCSPP) provides a framework for educators to share and disseminate information about the research, pedagogy, curricula, training, and standards for educating students to be effective professional clinical psychologists. Throughout its history, NCSPP has demonstrated its commitment to preparing highly competent, multiculturally sensitive, and socially relevant psychologists. 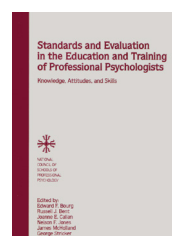

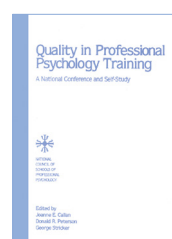
1989
Puerto Rico Conference
Ethnic Diversification in Psychology Education Marking an intellectual and organizational turning point for NCSPP, the conference is designed to address ethnic minority issues and the potential role and contributions of multiculturalism in NCSPP. Leads to the publication of *Towards Ethnic Diversification in Psychology Education and Training in 1990*.

1988
Scottsdale Conference
This conference focused on the development of professional education for psychologists leading to collaboration by the Psychotherapy, Independent Practice, and Family Psychology divisions of the APA. This cooperation spurred the foundation of the Joint Council on Professional Education in Psychology.

Mission Bay, CA Conference
The first of what was to become an annual series of NCSPP conferences providing a blueprint for future development in professional education.

Incorporation of NCSPP
Full membership is restricted to APA accredited programs and associate membership is made available for schools seeking accreditation.

1981
La Jolla Conference
Quality and Professional Psychology Training. This first NCSPP conference initiates a self-study to obtain detailed information about professional schools.

1997
NCSPP EDUCATION MODEL
Peterson, Peterson, Abrams, and Stricker. "[T]he National Council of Schools and Programs of Professional Psychology's model for education and training in professional psychology is summarized in five areas: (a) broadened view of psychology with a flexible epistemology, multiple ways of knowing, and how practitioners doing practice remain local clinical scientists doing disciplined inquiry; (b) integrative pedagogy; (c) competency-based core curriculum integrating practical and scientific knowledge, skills, and attitudes; (d) elements of practice, including multiple roles, the self of the psychologist and reflective practice-practicum and internship training and systemic evaluation; and (e) the social nature of professional psychology and its social responsibility, including ethnic and racial diversity and gender." Bahamas Conference
Evaluation in Professional Psychology. Examines the conception and evaluation of professional competence in students.

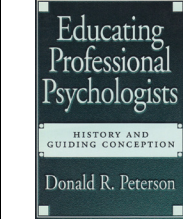

Charleston Conference
Creating Opportunities through Emerging Competencies: Personal and Institutional Empowerment. Participants review the present and envision the future of teaching, supervision, consultation, management, diversity, and advocacy.

1998
Santa Fe, NM Conference
NCSPP in a Changing Profession: Critical Conversations and Social Responsibility. Examined professional psychology's estimation of social issues relevant to practice and education.

1997
San Antonio Conference
Collaboration and Integration for Professional Psychologists: New Roles and Models. Focused on demonstrating psychologist's effectiveness through collaboration in various service/education settings.

1996
Clearwater Conference
Innovations in Professional Psychology Education and Practice: Preparing for the New Millennium. This conference focused on a broad range of innovations in professional psychology, education, and practice.

1994
Cancun, Mexico Conference
Standards in Professional Psychology: Reflection and Integration. This conference focused on uniting past conference themes forming a cohesive focus and objectives for NCSPP.

1993
La Jolla Conference
Clinical Training in Professional Psychology. Focuses on practicum and internship training guidelines, models, and social relevance of field placement training.

1991
Tucson, AZ Conference
Women's Issues in Professional Psychology. This conference called for incorporating feminist values into the educational model. Described as "raising the roof" for women experiencing the glass ceiling, the conference provided reflection and vision for curricular, employment, research and service issues regarding women in psychology.

1990
San Antonio, TX Conference
The Core Curriculum in Professional Psychology. "Reaffirming and expanding on the Mission Bay resolutions, the San Antonio conferees discussed and articulated: (a) each of the six professional core curriculum areas in substantial detail; (b) the social nature of professional psychology; (c) the multiple ways of knowing necessary in the discipline; (d) the practitioner as 'local clinical scientist'; (e) the self of the professional psychologist and reflective practice; (f) preparation for multiple roles." 2009
Puerto Vallarta, Mexico Conference
Leadership: Preparation & Transformation. Considered psychologists' leadership roles in a rapidly changing diverse and global society. With an aim toward integrating leadership into 21st century training and practice, we explored leadership training for students and leadership as a competency.

2008
Austin, TX Conference
Advancing the Multicultural Agenda: From Aspiration to Actualization. This conference provided didactic presentations and opportunities to dialogue about multiculturally-informed theory, competencies, social action, teaching, and interventions.

2007
Internship development was a focus of attention in 2006-2007. A challenge was issued to member programs to create at least one new or additional internship position.

2007
Ft. Lauderdale Conference
Developing our Competencies in Clinical Training. Participants developed the Developmental Achievements Levels (DALs) of the seven NCSPP competencies, focusing on knowledge, skills, and attitudes of each competency through three levels: entry to practicum, entry to internship, and degree completion. Working groups revised the DALs following the conference which were later endorsed by membership.

2006
Las Vegas, NV Conference
Global, Academic, Practice and Community Leadership: NCSPP as Change Agent. Sought to position NCSPP at the leading edge of professional psychology education, envisioned new leadership roles for graduates, advanced women as global leaders, and celebrated our 30th anniversary—paying witness to NCSPP's evolution from outsider to becoming the largest education and training council. The first Innovation Award was granted, NCSPP conference planning guide was created, and Royal Blue was chosen as the official Psy.D. color.

2005
Coronado, CA Conference
Realizing Our Competencies Through Teaching and Learning. The Professional Psychology Accreditation Summit reformulates the APA Committee on Accreditation; proposed the Assessment of Competency Benchmarks Work Group through the Council of Chairs of Training Councils (CCTC) and the APA Board of Educational Affairs; completed an NCSPP self study; revised bylaws, policies, and procedures; instituted detailed reports to the membership for all liaison activities; and began a 3-year NCSPP strategic planning process.

2004
Washington, DC Conference
The Psychologist as Advocate: Contributions to Public Interest, Policy and Social Responsibility. This conference focused on educating NCSPP delegates about the value of advocacy and their role in gaining legislative support for psychology education and training.

2003
Diversity is added as the seventh NCSPP Core Curriculum competency. Liaison/outreach activities are revived and expanded, and by-laws are updated.

2003
Scottsdale, AZ Conference
Strategic Impact: Continuing to Shape the Future of Professional Psychology. Explored how we preserve our future and how best to educate and train psychologists for the 21st century. NCSPP founder Nicholas Cummings provided the keynote.

2002
Puerto Vallarta, Mexico Conference
Educating Professional Psychology Students to be Social Change Agents. Speakers and discussion groups focus on advancing the ability to educate psychologists to take greater responsibility for social change and to be developed as "public practitioners" and "citizen therapists."

2001
Grand Bahamas Conference
Focus on Student Development, Challenges, and Best Practice. This conference provided an opportunity to focus on and hear NCSPP students. Participants discuss and examine enhancing the professional development of students and how to manage problems involving students.

2000
Miami, FL Conference
Creating our Future: Doctoral Level Education of Clinical, Counseling, and School Psychologists. First combined meeting of the four training councils in doctoral education. Recognizing the similarities and differences and strategies surrounding how to work collaboratively to strengthen the education of psychologists. Martin Selligman presents the keynote address, "Positive Psychology and Training for the Next Decade."

2014
New Orleans, LA Conference
Social Justice Training in Professional Psychology: Promoting Vision and Action. The 2014 Mid-Winter Conference focuses on social justice training in professional psychology. Goals include understanding and expanding our fundamental role in social justice work; learning advocacy skills to serve diverse communities; empowering participants to engage in individual, professional, and collective action regarding social justice.

2013
Nassau, Bahamas Conference
Relationship Competency. Conference focused on relational competency within NCSPP, and across training councils and other organizations. The conference provided a vision for NCSPP's role and relational position within the larger training and education community. Approximately 12 other organizational liaisons attended.

Third Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service was held at The Ranfurly Homes for Children in Nassau, Bahamas.

2012
Courageous Conversations 2 (CC2) convened with renewed focus on the internship imbalance. This was a follow-up meeting to the 2008 Internship Imbalance meeting. CC2 consisted of representatives from NCSPP, CUDCP, APPIIC, CDSPP, and CCPTP along with a representative from APAGS.

2012
New Orleans, LA Conference
Excellence in Outcome Assessment: Ideas, Tools, and Practices. This conference provided members with a toolkit for assessing outcomes, and provided strategies and techniques for assessing the following areas: student competencies, program goals and objectives, student performance on practicum/internship, quality of practicum/internship sites, program review, faculty evaluation, and utilizing outcome data to direct program decisions.

Second Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service was held at the Intercultural Charter School in New Orleans, LA.

2011
San Juan, Puerto Rico Conference
NCSPP 2025: Leap into the Future. Conference participants examined the future of psychology practice, education and training. Topics included diversity/demographics, technology, money and economics, prescriptive privileges, primary care, the military, the VA, forensics, international perspectives, and inter-professional collaboration.

First Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service was held at The Ponce School of Medicine, Clinical Psychology Doctoral Program in Ponce, Puerto Rico.

2010
Orlando, FL Conference
Training for Integrated Health Care (IHC). The focus of this conference was preparing students to work in healthcare settings. Implications for curriculum, practicum, and internship training were addressed.

Joint Meeting of Training Councils in Psychology (CCTC). This was the second combined conference that brought together 10 organizations involved in professional psychology education and training. There was continued emphasis on collaboration across training councils in preparing competent psychologists.
